



A History of the North Penn School System

The roots of public education in the North Penn area predate the Civil War when simple one-room schoolhouses dotted the countryside. They offered schooling at the most basic level because all the primary grades were taught by a single teacher in that one-room environment. Students who wanted "higher" education had to travel to a town where advanced courses were available. As villages grew into larger boroughs in the 1880s, 12-year diploma programs were offered in these schools, and senior classes evolved – some with as few as a single student.

Lansdale School District was formed in 1871, a year before the community became an incorporated borough. In 1872, its first public school was built on East Main Street, where Citizens Bank now stands. The first graduating class in 1888 consisted of four students. The original school on Main Street was replaced by the larger Broad Street and Green Street schools in 1888 and 1899, respectively, but it was not until 1914 that the first Lansdale High School was built on the site of the present McDonald's restaurant.

An influx of new industries and affordable residential housing quickly pushed the high school building past capacity, and in 1930, the school board agreed to build a new high school on Penn Street, where there would be plenty of room for future expansion. Because of this foresight, the second Lansdale High School stood the test of time much better than its predecessor. Over a period of 40 years, the campus grew to serve a total of seven towns and townships in the region.

When regional consolidation took place in 1955, the Penn Street school underwent a massive expansion project that more than doubled the size of the original school. In June 1955, the final Lansdale High School diplomas were awarded, and three months later North Penn High School was born.

Like Lansdale, Hatfield's education system evolved from one-room schools into a larger school that began offering advanced grades during the 1890s. Hatfield Consolidated School District was formed in 1921 when residents of the borough and township agreed to erect a modern high school on the borough-township line in 1921. The new facility contained 19 rooms and was built on a 10 1/2-acre tract at Fairgrounds and Cowpath Roads. When the building opened in September, 1922, it was the first six-year high school in this part of the state. A total of 492 students were brought together under the same roof, taught by a 15-member faculty. Hatfield High featured the largest auditorium and gymnasium between Philadelphia and the Lehigh Valley. Now the home of the Biblical Theological Seminary, Hatfield High School's last graduates received their diplomas in 1955. The high school closed its doors on June 10, 1955, and in September, 1955, Hatfield's underclassmen began attending the North Penn Joint High School in Lansdale.

Public education in North Wales also began with a one-room school located on Main Street that was built before the town was incorporated in 1869. The bustling young town soon outgrew its first schoolhouse and a new one was erected at Third and School Streets. By the 1890s that structure also proved inadequate and a three-story addition was built to house all 12 grades. North Wales held its first commencement in 1887 – with one student receiving a diploma. The School Street building was replaced in 1928 by what is now North Wales Elementary School on Summit Street. Like Lansdale and Hatfield, North Wales became a part of the North Penn Jointure in 1955, ending the era of independent school districts – and high schools – in each town.

To come full circle, the post-World War II construction boom impacted the once rural townships of Hatfield, Montgomery, Upper Gwynedd and Towamencin much like the rapid growth the boroughs experienced a half-century earlier. The venerable Lansdale/North Penn High School was no longer able to contain the influx of new students. In 1971 a new, massive high school campus was built in Towamencin, and Penn Street was converted into what is now Penndale Middle School.

A History of the North Penn Alumni Athletic Association Hall of Fame

The NPAAA was founded in the year 2000 with a mission to uphold the standards and prestige of the North Penn High School athletic program and to encourage and promote higher education through scholarship awards to those student athletes who demonstrate courage and sacrifice during their athletic careers.

The NPAAA expanded its mission in 2004 when a decision was made by the Board of Directors to establish a Sports Hall of Fame to recognize those alumni from North Penn High School and its legacy schools who best exemplified those high standards while participating in athletics in high school.

After the NPAAA voted to initiate an athletic Hall of Fame, the Board of Directors proceeded with defining its vision. First, the NPAAA had to establish a criteria and guidelines to provide a systematic methodology for selecting inductees. Once that was established, the NPAAA established three committees: one to research, prioritize and select the inductees; a second to determine appropriate inductee awards and method of recognition; and a third to initiate a fundraising campaign to provide the monies necessary to support the NPAAA's dual mission of scholarship awards and athletic recognition.

The mission of the NPAAA is sustained by a desire to provide future generations with a historical record of the outstanding student athletes and teams representing North Penn High School and its legacy schools (Hatfield High School, Lansdale High School, and North Wales High School). This history, which provides both a source of pride and a standard to emulate, dates back to 1887.

On October 8, 2005, the NPAAA hosted its Inaugural Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony at North Penn High School. Fifty-two athletes (spanning eight decades) and one team were inducted. The ceremony was attended by several hundred people and included the enthusiastic endorsement and participation of North Penn School District Officials. A program was provided that included the history of the schools, a history of the team inducted, and profiles of the inducted athletes. An announcement was made at this event about plans to establish a permanent Hall of Fame in North Penn High School. This initiative was presented to North Penn High School District Officials and was enthusiastically approved.

A fundraising campaign was initiated immediately following the Inaugural Hall of Fame Induction Event and by mid-August 2006, the NPAAA raised sufficient funding to proceed with the creation of the Hall of Fame. A vendor was selected to provide the raised metal plaques that would be installed in North Penn High School, and plans were finalized for the Second Annual NPAAA Hall of Fame Event.



The Hall of Fame was dedicated and unveiled at the Second Annual NPAAA Hall of Fame Event on October 14, 2006. The NPAAA continues to raise funds to support the annual cost of adding the new inductees plaques to the wall.

GLANCING BACK FIFTY YEARS AT WHAT MIGHT HAVE BEEN: THE 1960 NPHS FOOTBALL SEASON

Background Information: In 2008, The NPAAA Hall of Fame honored the Championship Teams of the first year of the jointure, the teams recognized as "The Fabulous Four of Fifty-Six." They were:

- Boys Soccer Tri-County Champions, 1955
- Boys Basketball Bux-Mont Champions, 1956
- Boys Track and Field Bux-Mont Champions, 1956
- Girls Softball Bux-Mont Champions, 1956

This year, we honor the 1960 NPHS Football Team. This is their story:

- In 1951, Doylestown High School became Central Bucks High School
- In 1953, Sellersville-Perkasie High School became Pennridge High School
- In 1961, Ambler High School became Wissahickon High School, and
- In 1955, North Penn High School was created from the blending of Hatfield High School, Lansdale High School, and North Wales High School

As the various committees of the North Penn Alumni Athletic Association researched the sports history of North Penn High School, they verified that the first NPHS football team (1955) finished in third place in the Bux-Mont League with a very respectable 7-2 record under Head Coach Bob Chubb. Four disappointing seasons followed.

However, in 1955 a promising group of seventh graders came out for the football team and played together throughout their junior high school years. They completed their ninth grade season in 1957 with an undefeated Bux-Mont League Championship. This group was the first to come through the new jointure as a team unit as they entered tenth grade. They continued to play as a cohesive group through their senior year.

In 1960, with a seasoned group of seniors, great anticipation arose for a Championship Team at North Penn. Even today, some football evaluators believe that the 1960 team was the strongest and most talented team to represent North Penn prior to the Co-Championship team of 1968 and the last Bux-Mont Championship Team of 1983. (In the late 1980s, the State of Pennsylvania established a playoff system for District and State Champions.)

As the 1960 season progressed, North Penn was certainly playing championship football. Their record going into the Quakertown game at home was 5-0, and the contest promised to be a battle to the end. Prior to the game, NP celebrated Parents' Night, honoring the mothers and fathers of the team members.

As predicted, the game was highly competitive. After a fumble recovery by Ed Rambo, North Penn had the ball on the 13 yard line. Three plays later, John Knoll plunged in for the TD (NP 6 – Quakertown 0). Quakertown tied the score on a long drive. After a NP punt, Quakertown drove 53 yards for a score to take the lead, 12-6. On a nice 50 yard drive featuring runs by Terry Rodenhaver and Ron Hangey, capped with a John Knoll touchdown and extra point by Rodenhaver, North Penn led at halftime, 13-12.

In the second half, Quakertown scored a touchdown in the third quarter and took the lead, 18-13. Then, with Quakertown deep in their own territory, a forced fumble was recovered by North Penn's Dan Drissel at the 27 yard line. Again, North Penn drove for the touchdown and recaptured the lead, 19-18.

In the fourth quarter, Quakertown punted out of bounds at the North Penn 25 yard line. On this final drive by North Penn, Ron Hangey scored on a 7 yard run which featured a key block by Ed Rambo. The successful extra point kick by Terry Rodenhaver made a final score of North Penn 26 – Quakertown 18. As 1:33 ran off the clock, the Knights remained undefeated at 6-0. Expectation for the first North Penn Football Championship was extremely high as the team and coaches returned to school Monday.

On Saturday night, October 22, 1960, Claude Deiley, the father of North Penn's starting left guard Boyd Deiley, suffered a heart attack and was recovering at Grand View Hospital. Following football practice on Tuesday, October 25, five North Penn starters went to visit Mr. Deiley at Grand View. On the way back to Lansdale, the players' car was involved in an accident with another car at Happy Hill Farm on County Line Road. All the players were ejected from the car, and all had to be hospitalized. Involved in the accident were Quarterback Bill Zinsmeister, Halfback Terry Rodenhaver, Guards Boyd Deiley and Ed Rambo, and Tackle Bob Grimes. As a result of the head-on collision, the driver of the other car was killed, and a passenger (her mother) sustained serious injuries. The sobering tragedy stunned the entire North Penn community.

North Penn had four games remaining on its schedule. The remaining senior class team members were Frank Robison, Ron Hangey, John Knoll, George Loux, Kurt Gehringer, Ron Koehler, Al Eddy and Ray Townsend. Since none of the injured starters were able to return to play those last four games, younger and less experienced players were required to meet the challenges of the remaining contests. Without a doubt, this calamity had a profound, life-long mark on the entire 1960 team, bringing them closer together and hastening their maturity.

Souderton and Upper Perkiomen, always scrappy teams, could never be taken lightly. Indeed, Souderton surprised North Penn's shaken team with a 21-0 win. The Knights played a better game against Upper Perkiomen, winning 45-19, and regained some of their confidence and composure.

The remaining schedule included two very strong opponents – Pennridge and Central Bucks – who had played each other to a 19-19 tie.

The North Penn at Pennridge game ended with North Penn on the 2 yard line ready to tie the game, but the snap was fumbled, leading to a painful 19-12 loss.

The Thanksgiving Day game against rival Central Bucks was next in line. The Bucks scored 13 points in the first quarter, followed by 18 points in the second quarter, with strong efforts by their very fine running backs Nathanial Duckett, Ron Kramer, and John Fonash. Score at half time: CB 31, NP 6. The sole North Penn touchdown was provided by a Flea Flicker Pass from Ron Lacher to Ron Hangey.

In the fourth quarter, Central Bucks scored three more touchdowns, while North Penn scored twice on two Ron Hangey TD runs, making the final score Central Bucks 50, North Penn 20. The year that had started with a hope of 10-0 finished with 7-3. An entire team had risen to maturity and experienced the hard vagaries of life in the short span of a month.

In recognition of a great try at "what might have been" the first Bux-Mont Championship by a North Penn football team, and – more importantly – in recognition of great courage in battling back following a tragic auto accident which claimed one life and injured six, we salute the 1960 North Penn High School football team. They will never be forgotten. They had "the right stuff."



The sport of swimming has always been an important part of Bill Berardelli's life. Having competed in age group swimming in the 1960s, high school and college swimming in the 1970s and coaching in the 1980s and 1990s, swimming has always been a passion. As early as high school Bill knew that he wanted to follow in the footsteps of his mother and father who were both educators and coaches, and give back to the sport that had enriched his life so much.

While attending Methacton High School, Bill earned All-State recognition in swimming and water polo and upon graduating in 1975 attended West Virginia University on a swimming scholarship. In college Bill was a four year varsity letter winner, team captain, and held several university records.

In 1981 Bill started his career in education, teaching social studies and coaching swimming and water polo at Upper Perkiomen High School. In 1988 Bill was hired by North Penn High School as a social studies teacher, and under head coach Rick Carroll, became an assistant coach for the Boys Swimming and Diving team. Upon Rick Carroll's retirement in 1989 Bill became the head coach of North Penn Boys Swimming and Diving team and served in this capacity until 1994.

Bill served as head coach of the North Penn Boys Swimming and Diving program from 1989-1994 and head coach of the North Penn Girls Swimming and Diving program from 1990-1992. Blessed with a well established program, talented and hard working athletes, the boys and girls teams flourished. Between 1989 and 1994 the boys team went undefeated in dual meet competition, won six consecutive Suburban I and District I titles and three PIAA State titles. The girls team won Suburban I and District I titles in 1991 and 1992 and were PIAA Runner-ups in 1991. Along with the past and present boys coaches Rick Carroll, Bill Bartle, and Brian Faikish, Bill Berardelli was part of a 258 dual meet win streak that spanned over three decades and is one of the longest win streaks in high school sports.

In addition to coaching swimming, Bill started the North Penn Water Polo program. The boys and girls teams began playing in the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Water Polo League. The boys won the Southeastern Pennsylvania Championships in 1990, 1991, and 1992 and placed second in the Pennsylvania State Water Polo Championships in 1992. The girls team won the Southeastern Pennsylvania Championships in 1991, 1992, and 1993 and placed second in the Pennsylvania State Championships in 1993. In 1991 and 1993, Bill was recognized as the Pennsylvania Water Polo Coach of the Year.

Bill retired from coaching swimming and water polo in 1994 and continues teaching social studies at North Penn High School.





Julie was a four time varsity letter winner, four time North Penn Swim Team MVP, and a four time N.I.S.C.A All-American. As a freshman in 1990, she was a member of the District One and PIAA AAA State Championship Team. Swimming World magazine recognized the 1990 North Penn Girls Swim Team as the National High School Champion. At the State championships meet Julie won the gold medal in the 100 yd. breaststroke, breaking the state record and establishing a new pool record for the Penn State University Natatorium. She was also a member of the 1st place State 200 Medley Relay that set a National Public High School Record. 1990 was a very special year for Julie Krail. She received North Penn's "Most Promising Freshman Award", the North Penn Reporter's Reader's Choice Award as a top female athlete and was recognized as "Athlete of the Week" in the Philadelphia Inquirer, The North Penn Reporter, The Times Herald and The Intelligencer newspapers. 



During the first week of the spring season Tim had his knee scoped. This was a minor set back and soon Tim and teammate Brian Wethey were setting relay records in the Shot Put, Discus and Javelin. At the end of the year Tim was runner up at the Bux Mont Championships in the Javelin; District One Champion for a second year in the javelin and again qualified for the PIAA State Championships. At the State Championships, on his second throw, he added 8 feet to the school javelin record throwing 215'5". This new school record lasted only a few minutes when teammate Brian on his next throw, threw 219'3". Tim was PIAA State runner up and Brian was champion. Next was an invitation from the Golden West National meet in Sacramento, California. At the Golden West Tim placed first and became North Penn's only individual Track & Field National Champion.

Tim's collegiate career was spent at the University of Pittsburgh; he competed in the Indoor and Outdoor Track programs. During the indoor season Tim showed his versatility competing in the pentathlon. In 1986 and 87 Tim was runner up in the javelin at the Penn Relays. In 1986 and 87 he was the Big East champion and University of Pittsburg javelin record holder. In 1987 Tim was the University of Pittsburg high point scorer for Track & Field.

After college Tim became the assistant Boys Track coach at North Penn High School. Working with Coach Richard Swanker, he coached from 1988 to 1999. His main coaching responsibilities' were the throws; he continued to compete with and against athletes he coached. While at North Penn he coached league, district and state champions. In 1999, after the birth of his third child, Tim retired from coaching.

During Brian's high school athletic career he earned 6 varsity letters; 3 in basketball, and 3 in spring track & field.

Brian first earned a starting spot on the varsity basketball team in the winter of his sophomore year, where he held a spot through his senior year. His senior year he was the 1984 basketball team captain, recipient of the Most Valuable Player Award and an All-Bux Mont First

In 1982 and 1983 Brain participated on the spring track & field team and lettered both years. In 1983 end of the year awards Brian received the Conver Field Award. During the 1984 spring track & field season, Brian placed first at the Bux-Mont Championships in the shot put, discus, and set the meet record in the javelin with a throw of 205'2". At the District One Track & Field Championships Brian placed first in the discus and took second place in both the shot put and javelin. In the 1984 PIAA State Track & Field Championships, Brian won the gold medal in the javelin; setting a new North Penn High School record throwing 219'3". He competed against his teammate, Tim Kulig, who threw 215"5" (second place) at the same meet. Between the two of them, they broke the school javelin record of 207'2"several times, which Tim set a week earlier at the District One Championships. While participating in a post season Tri-State "Meet of Championships", Franklin Field, Philadelphia, PA. Brian set the current North Penn High School javelin record and a Franklin Field high school boy's javelin record of 220'3". He also placed second in discus, and fourth in the shot put. Brian was invited to the Golden West National Track & Field Classic in Sacramento, California, he again found himself in a duel with friend and teammate, Tim Kulig. Brian finished second to Tim at the national meet in the javelin. At the end of year awards Brian was co – MVP of the 1984 Spring Track & Field Team.

After a successful career at North Penn High School, Brian went on to Hagerstown Junior College. While at Hagerstown, Brian participated on the basketball and track & field teams. He was a steady contributor averaging 10 points, 10 rebounds and 3 steals per game. While at Hagerstown he set team records for seasons best field goal percentage (56.5%), most defensive rebounds in a season (208), and most steals in a single game (10).

Brian also participated in Track and Field while at Hagerstown. During the 1985 N.J.C.A.A. Region XX Track & Field Championships, Brian was awarded the meet's Most Valuable Player for winning in the shot put, discus and javelin. He was also awarded Hagerstown's 1985 Track & Field Team M.V.P. and was a NJCAA National Qualifier in the Javelin.

Brian was inducted to the Hagerstown Junior College Hall of Fame 2008.

Brian has worked for the past 19 years as a counselor at the Glen Mills Schools (Concordville, Pa). Sixteen of those years he served as an assistant track & field coach. As a Certified Level II, U. S.A. Track and Field throwing coach, and he presently is an associate shot put official at the Penn Relays. While at Glen Mills, Brian coached 12 District One champions, 17 indoor and outdoor state champions, and a two time national shot put champion, as well has having numerous athletes medal at both the state and national level. Brian continues to coach privately on an individual basis.


Brian currently resides in Glen Mills, Pa. with wife, Suzanne, and their four children, Sean, Allison, Kaitlyn, and Daniel.

The Girls Softball Team of 1981 followed a 1980 softball team that was Bux-Mont League Champion (for the sixth consecutive year); District One runner up, and State runner up; all this created the 1981 Maidens' mind set of being "#1 in 81". The Maidens returned six All Bux-Mont recognition players: Kathy Kreisher, Jeanne Kempf, Bonnie Bushnell, Mia Fields, Deb Engel and Marsha Herb. This was a solid nucleus for the 1981 team; however pitcher Heidi Cash had graduated and needed to be replaced. This task fell on Kathy Kreisher who would get better with each game. The 1981 Maidens regular season started March 26th with a 2 - 1 win over Quakertown and ended May 22 with a 13-0 win over Upper Perkiomen. With this win the 1981 Softball Team was Bux-Mont League Champions for the 7th straight year. After completing an undefeated Bux-Mont season with a 16-0 record, the North Penn Maidens swept the District playoffs,



winning all 4 games, three with shut outs. In the first round they beat Nether-Providence 6-0; in the second game, Boyertown 8-0; in the third game, Upper Moreland 8-1; and then they beat Neshaminy Langhorne 2-0 in the PIAA District One Finals. It was on to the PIAA AAA State playoffs; however, there was a change in the State playoff system. Instead of going to Shippensburg for all games, the first three rounds would be played at Patriot Field in Allentown. Game one of the PIAA AAA State playoffs was a win over Whitehall 11-1; game two was a 4-1 win over Parkland; game three was a 2-1 come from behind nail biter over Wyoming Valley Area, and it was on to Shippensburg for the State finals to meet Harbor Creek. In the PIAA AAA Softball finals Kathy and the Maidens shut out Harbor Creek, 4-0; Kathy had pitched a one hit 10 strike-out game. North Penn was the 1981 PIAA AAA Softball State Champions they truly were "#1 in 81".



The Maidens had won the Bux-Mont League Championship for the 7th year bringing the total of Bux-Mont League wins, from 1976 to 1981, to 91 wins and three losses; the PIAA District One Championship and the PIAA AAA State Softball Championship. North Penn placed six players on the All Bux-Mont Team. First Team: Kathy Kreisher pitcher; Jeanne Kempf catcher; Marsha Herb short stop; Bonnie Bushnell outfield; 2nd team Janice Fehr 1st base and honorable mention Mia Fields out field. The Maidens had finished the year with a team batting average of .316 and a fielding average of .914 and Kathy Kreisher was named North Penn's MVP. In post season play the Maidens had finished 8 – 0, scoring 45 runs, letting in 4.

The North Penn Girls' Softball Team of 1985 was a young team with a tough task of upholding a strong softball tradition. At the beginning of the season, many spots had to be filled; however, they did start with a formidable nucleus of four seniors - Tracy Glose (Capt.), Bambi Hassinger, Andrea Heller and Tracy Kelley.

The season started on a rough note with the team falling behind to Pennridge 6-1. As would be the case



throughout the season, the team "hung in there" and managed to win the game 15-9. While North Penn was hoping to look presentable at that time, they never questioned that they would win the Bux-Mont title. Given the tradition of the program, it was never a question of "if", but "how". The "how" was by getting down to fundamentals, practice and execution. With that thought process and by taking one game at a time, North Penn completed the regular season as the

undefeated Bux-Mont League Champions; 14-0. Despite the unblemished record, North Penn did struggle through most of their games. The Maidens hadn't been blowing teams out, but they kept winning with an ability to scratch out runs and do the little things needed. The pivotal game of the season would be the last league game against CB East. The Maidens fell behind 3-1 and weren't able to get much going against a tough East squad. Having already sewn up the Bux-Mont League title and with nothing on the line except the undefeated season, this team could have easily packed it in and let this game go. However, the character of this team wouldn't let that happen. After a rain delay, North Penn regrouped, came out on the field and in typical fashion won 10-6.

North Penn then swept the District Playoffs beating Lower Moreland 5-1, Ridley 7-2, Council Rock 3-1 in 11 innings, and the finals Coatesville 9-7 for the PIAA District One title. Once again, it would not come easy. The first two games were a struggle due to the slow speed of the pitching, then a marathon 11 inning game against a powerhouse in Council Rock, and finally a slug fest for the district title.

North Penn again swept the State Playoffs beating Middletown 3-0, Williamsport 9-6, Council Rock 2-0 in 8 innings and Harbor Creek 4-3 for the State title. The final out of the title game was typical of the season – not flashy, just business. No one told this team they weren't supposed to win. The Maidens relied on solid pitching, clutch hitting and air tight fundamentals, and never got down on themselves. This team was close, with everyone rallying around each other and keeping a positive attitude. When it comes to raw talent, this team might not have measured up to previous squads, but the road to the championship is littered with individual abilities – teams win championships. North Penn went much further than anyone expected. They were a proud group and pride carried them to a PIAA AAA State Softball Championship.

North Penn Placed four players on the All Bux-Mont Team: First team: Bambi Hassinger P; Tracy Glose (Capt.) C; Jean Essner OF; Andrea Heller OF. In addition, three players received Honorable Mention: Tracy Kelley, 2B; Lynn Dwyer, SS; Kris Martell, DH. As a team the Maidens finished with a .285 batting average and a 924 fielding average. Letter winners were: 1st award – Kris Martell 3rd, Lynn Dwyer SS, Tracy Smith OF, Marge Politikos SS, Janet Vincent mgr.; 2nd award – Tracy Kelley 2nd, Jean Essner OF, Eileen Rogers 1st, Sue Schaffer OF, 3rd award – Tracy Glose C and Captain, Bambi Hassinger P, Andrea Heller OF.
